

# Water Board Meeting Itinerary

**Synopsis:** Several weeks ago, Team 2, was involved with a foot pursuit and large open area search for Jesus Carrasco. Several hours beforehand, Carrasco had fired a handgun out the window of his vehicle while fighting with his girlfriend in the City of Highland. Carrasco fired his gun to threaten and intimidate her. Carrasco was located by Highland Deputies and took off at a high rate of speed. Carrasco ultimately crashed his vehicle near the Philip A. Disch Water Treatment Plant 134, and ran into the hills. Team 2 assisted with the search, but Carrasco was able to escape that day. Carrasco was later identified as a violent fugitive wanted on multiple felony warrants, by multiple agencies across the country including the United States Marshals Service. Carrasco was also a person of interest in several murders across the country.

**Training Timeline:** Tuesday, July 2, 2019

1300-1400 Hours: PT

1400-1430 Hours: Change locations to Philip A. Disch Water Treatment Plant 134

1430-1500 Hours: Safety brief and issue UTM equipment

1500-2200 Hours: Open air movement with integrated rope training

## **Parking and signage:**

We will not be impeding traffic, we will not need traffic controls. We will park off the roadway near the water treatment plant. Sheriff's training signs will be posted.

**Future Training:** Active shooter training is planned before the end of the year. This training will encompass realistic, testable, and verifiable scenarios for both the water district employees and SED personnel. Water district employees will be tested on the training they received from our discussion forum on the concepts of run, hide, fight. SED personnel will be tested on our response to dynamic and static situations couple with emergency medical care. This training does not have a set date, but is planned before the end of the year.

## **Benefits of Training:**

The East Valley Water District and the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department Specialized Enforcement Division have partnered in training for realistic critical situations. These situations could be anything and could occur anywhere at any time. Partnerships benefit the community, the water district, and the sheriff's department, by bringing public entities together for the common goals of training and preparation to set the groundwork for the best response.

Proper notifications will be made to all affected public and private entities in the area. Sheriff's Public Affairs Division will post a Tweet to put the information out there to the public. The water district will post information on their website.
